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<u>Algebra I</u> In Algebra I we began the year by learning about polynomials. We have already learned about the different types of polynomials, and how to find the degree of each type. We are currently learning how to find the product of two polynomials. Before we finish our study of polynomials we will be learning how to add and subtract them, and then we will learn how to divide some of the smaller polynomials.

Algebra II The sophomores and juniors in Algebra II started the year by reviewing several methods that are used to solve equations. We first learned these methods when the students were in Algebra I. After reviewing those methods, we moved on to solving some new types of equations that they had not seen before. We are currently learning how to solve absolute value equations. We are learning how to solve them as well as how to recognize the extraneous solutions that sometimes occur with absolute value equations.

<u>Trigonometry/Pre-Calculus</u> The students in Trig. are learning how to work with radicals. They have learned how to simplify different types of expressions that contain radicals. Now, we are moving on and learning how to perform arithmetic operations on those expressions. Eventually the students will learn how to use radicals to solve equations and inequalities.

<u>Physical Science</u> The Physical Science students began the year by learning about the different types of science classes that exist, and how they differ from each other. Now they are learning how to measure different quantities in science. We will lean how to measure distance, mass, weight, volume, and several other quantities as the year progresses. They will not only learn how to measure those quantities, they will also learn how to record their measurements with the correct labels and the correct resolution.

<u>Senior Math</u> In Senior Math, we started the year by finishing up some of the material that we did not have time to finish last year in Algebra II. When the year ended last year, we were talking about how to graph data in a scatter plot, and how to use that plot to make estimations and predictions. Since we did not get time to finish that last year, we finished it in Senior Math this year. Now we have moved on and are talking about Direct Variations. We will learn how to recognize a direct variation, and how to use them to solve problems.

We are off to a great start this year in the middle and high school resource room. The students are learning skills that will help them gain the confidence to be self-sufficient and the abilities to reach their highest dreams.

Part of their successes is the ability and freedom to choose their seat when they come into the classroom. This 21st century teaching method of flexible seating has shown great success nationwide. When students are afforded the opportunity to choose their seat in the classroom and in what capacity they sit, it is then that the students show greater attention in class and the ability to work at their highest potential.

Scholarship Opportunities through Youth Programs

<u>Patriotic Pen Essay Scholarship Program</u> is opened to all students in grades 6th, 7th, and 8th, including home-schooled students. Students must be a resident of the state where entered. The theme is "Why I Honor the American Flag" and the local deadline is October 20, 2018 with the Post and Auxiliary deadline on October 31, 2018.

A 300-400 typewritten word essays on is entered at the local level with hopes of moving on to District, State, and National competition. Scholarships are awarded at the National level.

At the local contest there will be one winner for every 15 local entries. Local entries move on to District competition, one district winner advances to State competition and one State winner advances to National Competition with the State winner competing for national prizes. Essay cannot be less than 300 words or greater than 400 words in length. Every word is counted regardless of length. Title (theme) and added footnotes so not contribute to the word count.

Essays are typed with no color or graphics. In no way may contestants identify themselves within their essay. <u>Do not put names on the essay</u>. The entry form is the essay's cover sheet. Staple the entry form on TOP of the essay. The essay should be positive and clearly focused. Poetry is not accepted. Quotations maybe used sparingly. Essays are judged on knowledge of theme, theme development and clarity of ideas.

Student deadline is October 20, 2018. Forms will be delivered to your school.

<u>Voice of Democracy Audio/Essay Contest</u> is open to all students in grades 9-12, including and home-schooled students. Foreign exchange students, students age 20 or over, previous Voice of Democracy first place state winners, GED or Adult Education Students are not eligible. This year's topic is "Why My Vote Matters".

Record an original three to five minute essay on an audio CD or flash drive. <u>ONLY ONE STUDENT PER CD OR FLASH DRIVE.</u> The student will submit the recording, typed essay and the entry form. No music, singing, poetry or sound effects allowed. The body of the essay must not identify you in anyway. Please label the recording (CD or flash drive) and the neatly typed essay with the students name, and attach the completed entry form. At the local contest there will be one winner for every 15 local entries moves on to District competition, one district winner advances to State competition and one State winner advances to National Competition with the State winner will receive an all-expense paid trip to Washington, DC for scholarship opportunities.

Judging criteria is originality, content and delivery. Student entry deadline is October 20, 2018 for the local contest, with the Post and Auxiliary deadline on October 31, 2018. Mary Ellen will be sending entry forms to each school.

<u>Voice of Democracy Audio/Essay Contest</u> is open to all students in grades 9-12, including and home-schooled students. Foreign exchange students, students age 20 or over, previous Voice of Democracy first place state winners, GED or Adult Education Students are not eligible. This year's topic is "Why My Vote Matters".

<u>Continuing Education Scholarship</u>=This scholarship is available to any auxiliary member (who has belonged for at least a year), spouse, son, or daughter of a member who wish to further their education by pursuing a college degree or a career direction at a technical school.

Applicants must be 18 years of age or older, complete the application, and submit an essay of 300 words or less. \$1,000 will be awarded to the winning applicant. Local deadline is February 1, 2019. Applications will be sent to National Headquarters by February 15, 2019. Applications are available from Mary Ellen Luikens and the school counselor.

Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest-Grades 9-12/home-schooled students are eligible. Deadline March 31, 2019. The Creative Patriotic Art Contest is a scholarship program for high school students. It allows students to express their creativity using different mediums. No digital art will be accepted, and artwork must be on paper or canvas. Students must attend school in the state of the sponsoring Auxiliary. Watercolor, pastel, pencil, charcoal, tempera, crayon, acrylic, pen and ink, or oil can be used. It will be judged on patriotic theme and technique.
