Importance of School Attendance

Governor Daugaard has proclaimed September as Attendance Awareness Month. At Scotland Schools, we place a high value on school attendance as part of the foundation of a student's success in their education. Showing up for school has an enormous impact on a student's academic success, starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. We realize that some absences are unavoidable. But we also know that when students miss too much school – regardless of the reason – it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your student is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent, which means missing 18 or more days over the course of an entire school year. At Scotland Middle and High School, the attendance policy states that students can actually lose credit if they miss more than 10 class periods in any one class in a semester. We don't want students to lose credit so having them here is extremely important.

For the last four years, my motto for the Middle School and High School has been Be Here, Be On Time, Be Respectful, and Be Great! The first three parts of that motto have a big effect on the last part. We need our students to be here because:

Each day's lesson builds off what was taught before. Missing just one class can put you behind.

Absences can affect other students if the teacher has to reteach things that were missed.

In-class activities, such as experiments and demonstrations, usually cannot be made up.

Missing class discussions and explanations can make it harder to understand assignments.

Class participation is often included in grading.

Poor attendance leads to lower grades. It also raises the risk of dropping out of school and taking part in criminal behavior.

Good attendance is an important habit. You can lose a job for missing too many days of work. Good attendance makes a difference! The teachers and staff at Scotland Schools are here for all students, but we need them to be here to get the full benefit of their education. Once again, absences are unavoidable at times and we understand that. However, we want to do all we can to make sure our students are here as much as possible so we can help them to that path of greatness we all know they can achieve. The Scotland School administration and teachers appreciate your support for our attendance efforts and we wish everyone a wonderful and safe 2018-2019 school year. Go Highlanders!

A New Journey for all of Us

FFA students have the opportunity this year to complete in fall competitions called LDEs, which stands for Leadership Development Events. We have started preparing early as it is a first for them and for me, as a new teacher. Some are working as a team, and others are preparing individually. Team events are Marketing Plan, Ag Sales, Ag Communications, and Ag Issues. The individual events Scotland will be participating in include Ag Broadcasting, Extemporaneous Speaking, and Job Interview. Students will be competing in Brookings on November 2nd, followed by the district competition to qualify for state on November 5th in Mitchell.

Hydroponics System is Hydrating the Plants



Students selected what seeds to plant on Friday when the box of seeds arrived. They also set up everything to make the system worked before leaving for the weekend. On Monday when students checked the seeds, all of them sprouted over the weekend. They have been excited to finally use the system that has been in progress since school started. Currently, we have asparagus, onion, radishes, and two types of flowers planted. It is going to be a trial and error with the various kinds of things we grow along the way.

Livestock Judging Field Trip

Over the past two weeks, students in the Introduction to AFNR class have been learning about livestock judging for cattle, sheep, goats, and swine. To help them better understand, the classes traveled to local farms on Monday, September 24th to judge the animals first hand.



Students had the opportunity to judge live sheep and learn more about judging wool at Pedersen's farm. The students may have been quiet on a Monday morning, but now are more curious about sheep's wool.

The second location the classes went to was Pravecek's to learn more about judging pigs. To aid in biosecurity, students learned why they needed to put on plastic coveralls and boots before entering the barn. Students asked many questions about why some of the animals looked different than others and about the operation.





A few students volunteered, at DeBoer's, to help put some of the beef animals in a smaller pen to make it easier to look for specific characteristics on the animal.

While we were waiting and watching the others help pen some animals, students were commenting on how cold it was. After seeing the sheep, pigs, and beef animals, students were discussing the smells they experienced and how it was going to affect them the rest of the day.

Parents, in order to attend the FAFSA workshop please make sure you have created a FSA ID prior to that evening. If you have previously created a FSA ID for yourself, you do not need to create another one, but please have your information available the night of the workshop.

You can use the attached worksheet to help you fill it out and remember what information you are providing, as you will use this FSA ID for years to come.

It is recommended that ALL students who are planning to further their education after high school, fill out the FAFSA form. It helps families access federal grants, work study, student and parent loans, and state grants and scholarships.





Exciting Robotics Class 2018-19

We now have an Introductory level robotics and an advanced robotics. In both courses we use the LEGO Mindstorms EV3 Robotic Building Kit.
